#### The Digitized Kodak Catalog Project (1886 - 1941): A Very Brief History

Most camera collectors at some point in their collecting careers pass through a Kodak phase some never come out of it. And if there ever was one name that came to be associated with both cameras and collecting, it was Kodak.

George Eastman received his first patent (for coating dry plates) and bought his first manufacturing facility in 1880, and in 1881 he started the Eastman Dry Plate Company. In 1886 he received a patent for the near-mythical Eastman Detective Camera, but it wasn't until 1888 that the first camera bearing the name "Kodak" was introduced.

One of the nice things about collecting Kodak is that the product line is pretty well known, and because the company produced annual catalogs for many years, collectors can be reasonably sure of what they're looking at, when it was made, the variations and so on - presuming that they have access to either the appropriate catalog, or a number of the many books which document Kodak, each to some greater or lesser extent.

But what would be really nice would be to have a complete set of Kodak catalogs in an easily accessible form and readily available. And since the advent of portable computing devices (PC, Macintosh, etc.) that's been possible - except for the difficulty of assembling a complete set of Kodak catalogs in one spot and then scanning them and making the results available.

The idea of digitizing a complete set of Kodak catalogs has kicked around the collecting community for many years. It's been proposed on a number of online forums, during meetings of various photohistory groups, and for years there have been many incomplete "Kodak CDs" on eBay but at best, they only contained a few catalogs - whatever the owner had available. But assembling a complete set of catalogs, then scanning and processing perhaps 3,000 to 4,000 pages, was a daunting task - if not completely overwhelming - and nothing ever came of it.

#### Until now.

In early 2010, the idea came up again, but this time we - "we" as in "the collecting community" - were lucky. A number of collectors were willing to loan their catalogs to this project and a couple of insane - wait, let's call them "dedicated" - dedicated enthusiasts - neither of whom collected Kodak, but both of whom enjoyed the challenge of such a project - were willing to put in the time and effort to scan and pull together the entire set of catalogs into a full-blown Kodak Catalog Digital Library.

Our initial objective was to include just the annual amateur catalogs, but it turns out that many cameras only appear in certain professional and specialty catalogs. We included as many of those as we could obtain so that almost every Kodak camera made in the US, Canada and Europe, would be documented - at least up to about 1941. After that, it becomes much more difficult as Kodak stopped producing annual catalogs as their product line became increasingly more diversified.

However, even with the additional "non-amateur" catalogs, we weren't completely successful in illustrating "every" camera Kodak ever made. There are an elusive few that might appear in specialty catalogs that we simply couldn't track down. If you can't find one of those odd cameras, that's no doubt why. We may do a revision at some point in the future if someone is willing to loan us a catalog that includes a camera that isn't already recorded.

In this project, a total of 67 catalogs were used from 1886 through 1941 including a number of professional and dealer catalogs, and in some years, two or even three different catalogs to cover all the bases. With the cooperation of a number of dedicated collectors, we were able to pull together all those catalogs and in June 2010, the project started in earnest.

By November 2010, we had scanned everything we needed and eventually all 67 catalogs were then reassembled as image folders and converted to the universally accepted PDF format and finally, converted into individually searchable PDFs which could then be searched globally as a collection.

For those of you interested in the statistics: about 200 hours of scanning time (we never want to hear that sound again), 67 catalogs and 3,908 page scans - which generated 7,917 original and processed images - and 11.4 GB of disk space. Additionally, another 100+ hours of technical development time was needed to convert the digital catalogues into a fully searchable "knowledgebase" that could be launched from most any standard web browser.

The overwhelming number of catalogs was loaned to us by that most remarkable of Kodak collectors, Charlie Kamerman of Eagle Creek, Oregon. Without Charlie, it's very doubtful that this project could even have been attempted.

But as it turned out, even Charlie didn't have all the publications that were needed, but he was able to track down the five that he lacked and was able to secure either a copy or high resolution images that we could work with. And so, our thanks to the contributors of the catalogs and scans that we used:

Charlie Kamerman for the vast majority of catalogs used and all his help, Steve Shohet for loaning a variety of test catalogs, Ryerson University (Toronto) for the 1886 Eastman Catalog George Layne for the 1890 New Kodaks Catalog, Mike Kessler for the 1891 Dealer Display Catalog, Ralph London for the 1893 UK Catalog, Michael Pritchard for the 1897 UK Catalog.

The digital side of the project - also known as "all of the work" - was done by Rob Niederman of Medina, Minnesota, and Milan Zahorcak of Tualatin, Oregon. Remarkably we're still friends and in a few years, we'll probably be able to talk about this project rationally.

And there you have it, a more-or-less done deal. We're fairly sure that it isn't quite perfect, and expect there will be some carping about something or other; but all-in-all, we believe this to be a pretty good product and can now move on to something else.

Our thanks to all of those involved.

## Have you snapshots of yourself to show your children?

For instance, on many of the Modern Kodaks there is a new feature which saves you the trouble of figuring out how to make the proper exposure. Below the lens is a scale which shows the correct shutter speed and lens opening to be used under the existing light conditions. Thus the chances for error are greatly reduced and no time is lost in arriving at the correct exposure.

The Modern Kodak is simplici-

ty itself. Everything possible has been made automatic. Things to adjust have been reduced to a minimum. Thus, good picturemaking, through the medium of the Modern Kodak, has been made easier than ever before.

With a Kodak—as a further distinction—you can write the date and title on the film at the time.

This feature is invaluable for certain types of pictures. No picture of a child, for example, is complete without the date. For travel pictures, either at home or abroad, the name of the place is essential.



## **Colored Cameras**



It may be accepted as fact, however, that various Eastman cameras, as announced in national advertising, will take full advantage of fashion's trend, both as to color and design.

A flexible program of this kind enables the Kodak Company not only to follow the color vogue, but, as far as available merchandise is concerned, to be a little ahead. In other words, here's one more example of Eastman enterprise.

VEST Pocket" describes its size. That's how small it is and, as a natural result, you can have it with you whenever you want, wherever you go. Vest Pocket Kodak can never be an inconvenience. People wear it like a watch and it wears well—just how well the pictures themselves will show you—clean-cut, sparkling, with negatives that readily lend themselves to enlargements. The picture size is  $15/8 \times 21/2$  inches—larger than might be expected from this little camera. However, the V. P. K. user is not limited to pictures of any definite size. All he has to do is to bring the negatives that he particularly prizes to his photo finisher. He will do the rest and large prints to brighten home or office are the result.

In many an album the pictures prized most are the work of this unassuming photographic instrument. "It's funny," is the comment as the album pages are turned, "but this little picture here I like the best." And the chances are that the V. P. K. made it.

N ORDER to make the best possible pictures under greatly varying conditions, a camera must have an unusually reliable and versatile shutter. It was with this in mind that the Kodamatic was developed.



It is constructed like a fine watch—precise to the last degree, thoroughly dependable, longlasting—to challenge successfully every situation in which the photographer finds himself.

A wide choice of automatic speeds—seven in all—is provided: 1/2, 1/5, 1/10, 1/25, 1/50, 1/100, and 1/150 or 1/200 (as listed); besides bulb and time. A sliding scale controlling the diaphragm shows at a glance the speed or stop to use in dull, gray, clear or brilliant light.

Adjustment is made in an instant, and the shutter makes the selected exposure with utmost accuracy. The Kodamatic is supplied on the *Special* Kodaks (except V.P.K.).

## **The Diomatic**

WHENEVER extreme speeds are not essential the Diomatic shutter is highly successful. It is modeled after the Kodamatic and, like it, has a handy sliding timing scale. Four automatic

speeds, 1/10, 1/25, 1/50 and 1/100, besides the usual *bulb* and *time*, enable the user to fit his exposure accurately to the light.

The Diomatic performs with all the sure precision expected of quality equipment, for it is designed and assembled with the same care that characterizes the more pretentious Kodamatic.





#### The Kodex

**P**EOPLE who prefer inexpensive and simply operated cameras nevertheless want an entirely trustworthy shutter that assures consistently good results. The Kodex meets these requirements. It has *bulb, time,* and automatic speeds of 1/25 and 1/50. Carefully, scientifically constructed, the Kodex is a worthy member of the group of shutters found on Eastman cameras.



THE anastigmat stands at the peak of photographic lens design. Because of high cost, however, it was formerly available only on equipment beyond the reach of the average amateur. It remained for the Eastman Kodak Company—one of whose plants is devoted almost exclusively to lens manufacture—to reduce costs to such an extent that now almost anyone can afford one of these splendid lenses.

#### **True Anastigmat Qualities**

Kodak Anastigmats record vertical and horizontal lines in the same plane with an equal degree of clearness. They have an essentially flat field—even when they are used at their widest openings all detail in the same plane is recorded with sharpness to the very edges of the negative.

And they have all the speed for which this type of lens is noted. The Kodak Anastigmat f.7.7, aside from its other advantages over the rapid rectilinear, is somewhat faster. The f.6.3 is sixty per cent speedier than the rectilinear, making snapshots possible under conditions that would be out of the question for an ordinary lens. The f.5.6, in turn, is one-quarter again as fast as the f.6.3, and the f.4.5 admits half again as much light as the f.5.6. It is interesting to note that the f.4.5 is practically twice as fast as the f.6.3, and almost three times as fast as the f.7.7.

#### Featured on Modern Kodaks

These superior lenses, the equals of any anastigmats made anywhere, are a prominent feature of all the Modern Kodaks. They offer a wide selection of fast lenses at low costs, enabling the amateur to make pictures under conditions that would have been thought impossible a few years ago.

#### Kodar Lens f.7.9

**T**HE Kodar *f.*7.9, a recent Eastman development, is of the anastigmat type. It is only a trifle faster than the rapid rectilinear which it replaces, but it approaches the anastigmat in defining and covering power and gives negatives of consistently high quality.

Kodar lenses cost but little more than the rectilinear type and are fully worth the small difference.



# **Kodak Metal Tripods**

THESE tripods, the result of many years of experience in constructing camera supports, are models of lightness, compactness and rigidity. The legs are of brass tubing, the sections in each telescoping neatly to give small collapsed size without sacrifice of strength. The lower sections and the heads are nickeled, while the upper sections are finished in black enamel.

There are six models from which to choose. When closed their lengths range from  $11\frac{3}{8}$  to  $15\frac{1}{2}$  inches, so that even the largest is convenient to carry. Nos. 1 and 2 have revolving heads which permit the camera to swing in any desired direction without moving the tripod itself. They also have straps to hold the legs in place when closed. Nos. 1C and 2C have solid heads. Their legs have no straps.



The head of No. 6 (illustrated in its carrying case) includes a hinge which permits the legs to fold flat—parallel to one another instead of in the usual triangular form. The result is a narrow shape which, with the extreme shortness of the tripod when closed, makes No. 6 easiest of all to carry.

### The Kodapod

THE little Kodapod is an exceedingly handy arrangement, particularly suited for use in place of a tripod in outdoor photography. The toothed jaws at one end firmly grip tree, fence or other wooden object, while the other end threads into any standard tripod socket.

### The Optipod



HERE is a neat little device—a combined tripod head and felt-lined clamp—that is frequently used instead of a tripod and, in many cases, in conjunction with that larger support.

Used alone the Optipod clamps to any shelf, table, window ledge, running board or other support, and holds the camera firmly while the exposure is being made. It fits any standard tripod socket. It is small and light, and slips readily into the pocket.

The ball and socket joint is a great conven-

ience since it permits tilting the camera to almost any angle. It is especially valuable when the Optipod is used in connection with a tripod to photograph subjects which are at close range or otherwise so situated that it is impossible to place the tripod alone in the desired position.

# Flashlight Materials

SINCE it makes one independent of daylight, flashlight photography is a year-around sport. Giving complete control of illumination, it means good indoor pictures under otherwise impossible conditions.

The simplest way is to use the Kodak Flash Sheet Holder and Eastman Flash Sheets. The latter are placed on the holder and ignited from behind. They burn slowly, giving a broad and powerful, yet soft, light.

THE negative-making material, plus the print paper, determines the quality of a finished picture. While a good camera—not necessarily an expensive one—is required to make good pictures, the best of cameras and the most expert photo finishing

cannot produce first class results on poor film.

The amateur needs a well balanced sensitive emulsion on his film, for he must sometimes "shoot" under trying conditions or lose his picture chance. If the lighting is harsh, with strong contrast between shadows and highlights, Kodak Film will give the best rendering of tones, for it has the necessary property to give correct gradations of tones from the highest lights down into the deepest shadows. In the terms of the professional, it has a "long scale." Without such a property a "soot and whitewash" effect would be obtained in the prints.

If the light is weak, Kodak Film, because of its speed, will help in getting the best pictures possible. This matter of speed is important, but a fine grained emulsion also has much to do with the quality of a picture, and it is most essential in the securing of satisfactory enlargements. Fine grain is an outstanding quality of Kodak Film.

Latitude also plays an important part. It is that property in a film which allows variations in exposure without detriment to negative quality. While speed reduces the danger of under-exposure, it is latitude that performs a similar service in minimizing the chance for overexposure.

Uniformity is not just a meaningless word. Kodak Film is uniform. It does not vary. It is the same from roll to roll, from month to month, so that the amateur can be assured that it will always act the same under like conditions, and he can govern his exposures accordingly. When once he has mastered the mechanics of his camera, and becomes familiar with exposures to give under various light conditions, he will always secure good results.



### **Elementary Photographic Chemistry**

THIS informative booklet fills the need for a simple account of photographic chemistry for practical photographers. Chapter I contains a brief introduction to elementary chemistry. 
