think that the Kodak is associated with the dark room, the compounding of chemicals, plate-holders, dark slides, focussing cloths, and other cumbersome old-fashioned appliances. Kodak simplicity has done away with all these; and whether you take up photography for its own sake—and it is well worth while—or because it adds to the pleasure of your other sport or pastime, you will find your path easy. The Kodak has brought the pleasures of photography within the reach of every one.

Added to this simplicity is the further advantage of convenience—the ease with which you can carry your Kodak. You can have a Kodak so small that it will go into your waistcoat pocket, and take up very little more room than a cigarette case. And there is no Kodak too large to be carried in the pocket, or in a neat leather case which can be hung over the shoulder as easily as a pair of field glasses.

The weight of a Kodak varies from 9-ozs. in the Vest Pocket size to 32-ozs. in the 3A or Postcard size, so that you will see, whether you treat yourself to the smallest Kodak or the largest the weight will be insignificant.

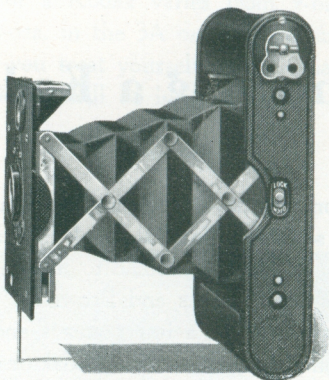
Choosing a Kodak

The question you have to decide is : Which of the many models will you select ? This little book is neither a catalogue nor a price-list. It does not pretend to give detailed particulars of the full range of Kodaks and Brownies. This chapter is intended merely to give you a few pointers and a little helpful advice before you go to your nearest Kodak dealer to make your final selection.

In the first place, you should know that all Kodaks and Folding Brownies are now made with the Autographic Feature. This means that when you have taken a photograph in the ordinary way, you open a little door in the back of the Kodak, write whatever particulars you wish, and then hold the writing to the light for a few seconds. The writing then becomes part of the film itself, and what you have written lasts as long as the picture it describes.

This ingenious little invention saves a tremendous amount of trouble when you come to arrange your pictures at the end of a holiday. It removes all doubt ; it answers the questions : Whose portrait is this ? When was it taken ? Where was it taken ? The Autographic Feature enables your Kodak to tell the **whole** story.

It is probable that no Kodak has ever been so popular as the Vest Pocket Autographic Kodak. Although this little Kodak is so small that it can be carried easily in the vest pocket, it is just as practical, and will make just as good pictures as the larger

models. The pictures it takes are $2\frac{1}{2} \times 1\frac{5}{8}$ ins., and these are of such high quality that they can be enlarged to practically any of the standard sizes without noticeable loss of detail.

The Vest Pocket Kodak is "Always with you ; never in the way." You can slip it in your pocket when you are going out for a walk ; when you are going fishing, golfing, shooting, or motoring—you can carry it as easily as a cigarette case.

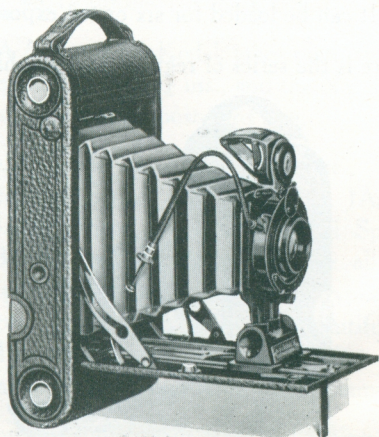
The Vest Pocket Kodak, like all the other Kodaks, can be loaded in daylight. You put in a little cartridge of Kodak Film, and this allows you to take eight pictures before you need to reload. These cartridges take up so little room that you can carry a supply in your pocket to last for a day's outing.

There is no trouble about focussing. The Vest Pocket Kodak is of the fixed-focus type ; when you want to use it, you simply pull out the front, sight the view you want to take on the view finder, press the shutter lever, and the picture is taken.

You may want, however, to take pictures a little larger than those you can take with the Vest Pocket Kodak. In this case you have a very wide range of Kodaks to choose from.

You have, in the first place, the series known as Autographic Kodaks Junior. First come the Nos. 1 and 1A. These two Kodaks are each made in two models—the focussing model is fitted with a scale, so that it can be focussed accurately to any distance from 6 to 100 feet or more. The fixed-focus model is without the scale; it gives a sharp image of all objects at a distance of eight feet and beyond.

The No. 1 takes pictures $3\frac{1}{4} \times 2\frac{1}{4}$ ins. ; it weighs only 23 ozs. and measures only $1\frac{7}{8} \times 3\frac{5}{8} \times 6\frac{5}{8}$ ins. Six pictures can be taken without reloading.

The No. 1A takes pictures $4\frac{1}{4} \times 2\frac{1}{2}$ ins.; it weighs only 28 ozs. and measures $1\frac{5}{8} \times 3\frac{3}{4} \times 8$ ins. It can be loaded to take either six or twelve pictures.

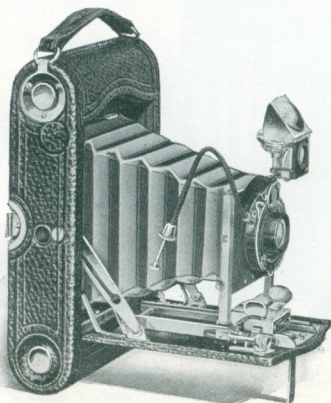
Either of these Kodaks can be carried in the pocket or in a neat little leather case slung over the shoulder.

In the same series are the Nos. 2C and 3A Autographic Kodaks Junior. These two Kodaks are somewhat larger than the Nos. 1 and 1A. They are both fitted with scales for focussing at various distances.

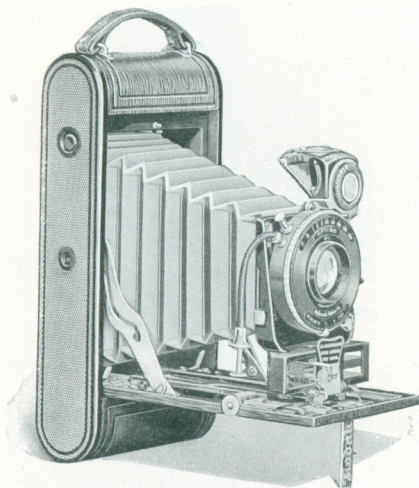
The No. 2C takes pictures $4\frac{7}{8} \times 2\frac{7}{8}$ inches—that is, slightly smaller than a postcard. Its size is $1\frac{3}{4} \times 4\frac{3}{8} \times 8\frac{3}{4}$, and it weighs only 35 ozs. It can be loaded for 10 pictures.

The No. 3A takes pictures of the usual postcard size— $5\frac{1}{2} \times 3\frac{1}{4}$ inches. Its size is $1\frac{1}{2} \times 5\frac{1}{8} \times 9\frac{3}{4}$ ins., and its weight is only 38 ozs. It can be loaded for six or ten exposures.

Then there is the series of regular Autographic Kodaks.



NO. 3 AUTOGRAPHIC KODAK.

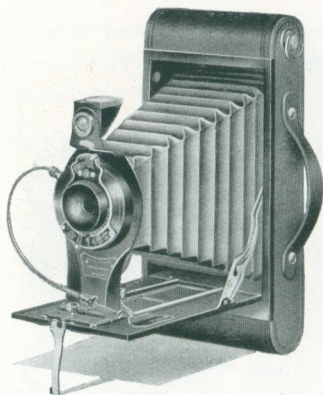


NO. 1A AUTOGRAPHIC KODAK SPECIAL

The No. 1A Autographic Kodak takes pictures $4\frac{1}{4} \times 2\frac{1}{2}$ ins. The No. 3 takes pictures $4\frac{1}{4} \times 3\frac{1}{4}$ ins., and the No. 3A takes pictures $5\frac{1}{2} \times 3\frac{1}{4}$ ins., the popular post-card size.

The Kodaks Special are a series de luxe. The Specials include the sizes mentioned above (the No. 1A, the No. 3, and the No. 3A). There is also the No. 1 Special, which takes pictures $3\frac{1}{4} \times 2\frac{1}{4}$ ins. The Specials are all fitted with modern Anastigmat lenses of the fastest types, and with high-speed Velosto Shutters. They are beautifully finished throughout and covered with the finest quality long-grained calf. The metal parts are nickel and black enamel.

For the young people, there are the Folding Autographic Brownies—sometimes called the little brothers of the Kodaks. These cameras have all the convenience and compactness of the

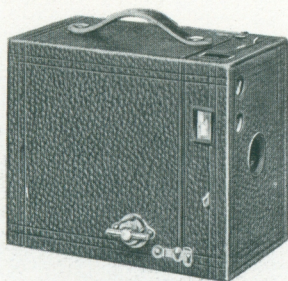


NO. 3A FOLDING AUTOGRAPHIC BROWNIE.

Kodaks with the extreme simplicity of the Brownies. The No. 2 Folding Autographic Brownie takes pictures $3\frac{1}{4} \times 2\frac{1}{4}$ ins., the No. 2A, $4\frac{1}{4} \times 2\frac{1}{2}$ ins., the No. 2C $4\frac{7}{8} \times 2\frac{7}{8}$ ins., and the No. 3A $5\frac{1}{2} \times 3\frac{1}{4}$ ins.

Then for the children there are the box-form Brownies. The No. 0 takes pictures $2\frac{1}{2} \times 1\frac{5}{8}$ ins., the No. 2 $3\frac{1}{4} \times 2\frac{1}{4}$ ins., the No. 2A $4\frac{1}{4} \times 2\frac{1}{2}$ ins., the No. 2C $4\frac{7}{8} \times 2\frac{7}{8}$ ins., and the No. 3 $4\frac{1}{4} \times 3\frac{1}{4}$ ins. The Brownies are so simple and easy to use that any child who has passed the kindergarten can make excellent pictures with them from the start.

These do not exhaust the list. There is the Graflex series for specialised, high-speed photography, when exposures in the neighbourhood of $1/1000$ th part of a second are required. And still another series called the Premos. The Premos are handy little cameras, made in various sizes, and designed to take Premo Film Packs instead of Kodak Roll Film.

Go to the nearest Kodak dealer, get full particulars and prices, and choose your Kodak now. Don't let all your happy times this year pass into the limbo of forgotten things. Make pleasing little pictures of the golden Downs; snap up the happy scenes on your motor trips; keep a record of your jolly sporting days; bring home pictures of your summer holiday; and don't forget to make snapshots of that chubby-faced little fellow sitting in the garden. Your Kodak pictures will be precious to you now, but priceless in years to come.



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
