
world over—made us by far the largest manufacturers of both photographic apparatus and photographic materials.

THE No. 0, No. 1 and No. 1A Folding Pocket Kodaks are the most compact of all cameras, yet are capable of a very high order of photographic work. They can be carried in the pocket without attracting attention. A single motion extends bellows and they are ready for use.

Enough film for an entire vacation trip, of a size to fit any one of them, could easily be carried in the pocket—and the weight is but a trifle.

No. 0, 1, and 1A Folding Pocket Kodaks

THESE Kodaks differ little except in size, all being equipped with the Eastman Automatic Shutter with which "snapshots" and time exposures are made by touching different levers. All three are fitted with excellent lenses, are covered with fine seal grain leather and have nickel fittings. The No. 1 and No. 1A have two finders, one for vertical and the other for horizontal exposures. The No. 0 has but one. Each one will slip readily into a pocket, and the aluminum construction makes them light yet strong. They each have capacity for 12 exposures without reloading.

THE latest model of the No. 2 Folding Pocket Kodak has rapid rectilinear lens, F. P. K. automatic shutter and the three-lock focusing device by which the front locks automatically at the desired focus or, with focus set at 20 feet, allows the instrument to be used as a fixed focus camera. A camera of unusual scope for an instrument taking $3\frac{1}{2} \times 3\frac{1}{2}$ pictures.

No. 2 Folding Pocket Kodak

THIS Camera takes pictures of the popular $3\frac{1}{2} \times 3\frac{1}{2}$ size yet folds into such small compass that it goes readily into the pocket. It measures but $1\frac{1}{2} \times 4\frac{1}{2} \times 6\frac{3}{4}$ inches, weighs 18 ounces and has capacity for 12 exposures without reloading or may be loaded for 6, 4 or 2 exposures. The F. P. K. automatic shutter with which the No. 2 Folding Pocket Kodak is equipped, has iris diaphragm stops Nos. 4, 8, 16, 32, 64 and 128, and has "instantaneous," "bulb" and "time" actions, and operates with either the bulb or finger release. It is always set.

The No. 2 Folding Pocket Kodak has a Rapid Rectilinear lens of high quality, and brilliant finder with hood. The three-lock focusing device permits setting the lens at different focus or the instrument may be used as a fixed focus camera.

THE No. 3 Folding Pocket Kodak is a most serviceable camera for those who insist upon an instrument which can be carried in the pocket; yet who wish to undertake important photographic work. It takes a picture $3\frac{1}{4} \times 4\frac{1}{4}$ inches; it is very compact and yery light, the body being of aluminum, and will stand the wear and tear of travel.

The No. 3 Folding Pocket Kodak

THIS camera is fitted with our F. P. K. Automatic Shutter which has iris diaphragm stops with openings for Nos. 4, 8, 16, 32, 64 and 128, and the "instantaneous", "bullb" and "time" actions. It has double combination lenses, strictly rectilinear and very rapid.

The camera has two tripod sockets, one for vertical, the other for horizontal exposures, and brilliant reversible finder with hood.

It has capacity for 12 pictures $3\frac{1}{4}$ x $4\frac{1}{4}$ inches, yet weighs only 23 ounces, and measures but $1\frac{5}{8}$ x $4\frac{1}{2}$ x $7\frac{1}{2}$ inches.

These instruments will be furnished with a rising and sliding front, for an extra charge of

one dollar.

By the use of a simple Adapter these cameras may be readily used with glass dry plates. This attachment has a ground glass for focusing and uses single aluminum plate holders.

THE No. 3 A Folding Pocket Kodak is broader in scope than anything heretofore attained in pocket photography. The size and shape of the pictures it takes, $3\frac{1}{4} \times 5\frac{1}{2}$ inches, makes it ideal for landscape work when used horizontally, while vertically it makes portraits of a very desirable size. 3A negatives are particularly adapted to post-card printing.

No. 3A Folding Pocket Kodak

THE lenses furnished with the regular equipment are rapid rectilinear and are selected and tested with the utmost care. They have a focal length of 6½ inches and a speed of f. 8, covering fully with this opening. The shutter is the F. P. K. Automatic,

described on page 11.

A desirable feature with which every No. 3A Folding Pocket Kodak is equipped is the rising, falling and sliding front. There are tripod sockets for both vertical and horizontal exposures, a brilliant reversible finder, a spirit level, reversing with the finder and a focusing scale. The measurements are 1½ x 4½ x 9½ inches, and the weight, loaded for 10 exposures 3½ x 5½ inches, only 41 ounces. Made of aluminum, covered with the finest seal grain leather, and with full nickel fittings. By the use of an Adapter (extra) 3½ x 4½ glass plates may be used.


WITH the No. 4 Screen Focus Kodak one can focus on the screen or ground glass without removing the roll of film from the camera. This camera will be especially appreciated by those careful photographers who wish to use film on account of its convenience, yet who want to be able to perfect the composition of their picture by seeing it on the ground glass before exposure. However, all the old Kodak simplicity is retained in this instrument.


No. 4 Screen Focus Kodak

Ready May 15th

THIS instrument like all of the other Kodaks is built on the Cartridge system daylight loading principle, but permits focusing on the screen or ground glass without removing the roll of film from the camera. This is accomplished by simply swinging the roll holder containing the film out of the focal plane whenever it is desired to use the ground glass. Focusing may be done between each exposure.

In operating, the film cartridge is loaded into the camera in daylight in the usual way. To focus on the ground glass, first pull a dark

slide from its position in the roll-holding part of the Kodak and insert it in front of the film. This renders the film chamber light-proof. The whole back of the Kodak containing film is then swung up out of the focal plane and a ground glass, always carried in the back of camera, is placed in position. The film cannot be swung up until the dark slide is in position in front of the film.

The roll holder being raised, it catches automatically. The screen or ground glass frame is then removed from its recess in roll holder, and snapped into position at the back instantly. After focusing the ground glass is returned to its place, and pressure on a spring releases catch which holds roll holder in position.

No. 4 Screen Focus Kodak—Continued

The film is then let down into the focal plane, the dark slide removed and exposure made. If desired the usual focusing scale may be used instead of the ground glass.

The No. 4 Screen Focus Kodak becomes a plate camera by merely removing the roll holder and adjusting the plate holder back containing ground glass and focusing shade.

The optical equipment consists of a Rapid Rectilinear lens of exceptional quality and the Kodak Automatic Shutter, which gives automatic exposures from $\frac{1}{100}$ to 1 second, and has the "bulb" and "time" actions.

It has rising and sliding front and brilliant reversible finder with hood; double extension bed; tripod sockets for both vertical and horizontal exposures, and is covered with finest seal grain leather with nickeled fittings.

THE purchase price of the No. 2 Flexo includes every requisite for picture taking except the film, whereas the price of most of the so-called \$5 plate cameras includes but one plate holder and a further expenditure of \$2 or \$3 is necessary to supply the required number of holders.

It has the Kodak Quality.

No. 2 Flexo Kodak

THE No. 2 Flexo is fitted with a fixed focus achromatic lens, set of three stops, finder, socket for tripod screw and our improved Rotary Shutter. Snap shots are made by pushing a lever alternately to the right or left. To make time exposures, a slide in the side of the camera is pulled up, and the Kodaker then merely pushes the shutter lever in one direction to open the shutter, and in the opposite direction to close it.

The Flexo has a capacity of 12 exposures without reloading, making pictures $3\frac{1}{2} \times 3\frac{1}{2}$ inches. It measures $4\frac{1}{2} \times 4\frac{1}{2} \times 5\frac{1}{2}$ inches, and weighs 19 ounces. Covered with fine seal grain leather, has nickeled fittings, and is handsomely finished.

Explicit directions for operating the Kodak and for developing and printing pictures come with each instrument. Anybody can make good pictures with a Flexo.

IN no camera is the Kodak simplicity more marked than in the No. 2 Bulls Eye. Anyone can learn to take good pictures with one of these simple instruments in a few minutes. It makes photography easy.

The pictures are the popular $3\frac{1}{2}$ x $3\frac{1}{2}$ size. Bust portraits of large size may be obtained by adjusting the Kodak Portrait attachment and bringing the camera within $3\frac{1}{2}$ feet of the subject.

The No. 2 Bulls-Eye Kodak

THE No. 2 Bulls-Eye first made the cartridge system of photography popular, and for more than 10 years its simple and practical excellence has maintained it as the leader among box form cameras. It has a capacity of 12 pictures, $3\frac{1}{2} \times 3\frac{1}{2}$ inches, measures $4\frac{1}{2} \times 4\frac{1}{2} \times 5\frac{1}{2}$ inches, and weighs 22 ounces. It has a meniscus achromatic lens with fixed focus of $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches, the Eastman Rotary Shutter, which allows both instantaneous and time exposures, set of three stops, brilliant finder, socket for tripod screw.

The No. 2 Bulls-Eyes are covered with the finest seal grain leather, have nickeled fittings and are handsomely finished.

Like all other Kodaks they are subjected to the most rigid inspection before leaving the factory.


A NY bright school boy or girl can readily learn to take pictures with a No. 1 or No. 2 Brownie Camera. But the fact that they are simple to operate does not mean they do not make good pictures. Indeed photographic work of a very high quality can be done with their accurate little lenses and shutters. The enormous quantities of Brownies sold makes possible their very low price, \$1 and \$2 each.

No. 1 and No. 2 Brownie Cameras

NO. 1 Brownie Cameras make pictures 2½ x 2½, loading in daylight for six exposures. They have 3½ inch focus meniscus lenses, and the Eastman Rotary Shutter, the same as the No. 2 Bulls-Eye Kodak (described on page 23), the shutter, however, having one stop only. These instruments measure 3 x 3½ x 4½ inches and weigh 8 ounces. V shaped lines on top of camera give the scope of view, or a Brownie finder (detachable) may be provided for only 25 cents.

The No. 2 Brownie Cameras differ little from the No. 1, except in size. They take pictures 2½ x 3½ inches, and have two finders. "Brownies" are covered with fine imitation leather, and have nickeled fittings. Instruction book free with each instrument.

Hundreds of thousands of the little box form Brownies are in successful use. The new Brownie is sure to attain an equal measure of popularity. It marks another forward step in the growth and development of the Brownie idea—the making of photography a cheap and simple enjoyment for everybody.

No. 2 Folding Brownie Cameras

THE No. 2 Folding Brownie takes pictures 2½ x 3½ inches and loads in daylight for six exposures. It has our new Brownie automatic shutter, with iris diaphragm, and a fine meniscus lens. It has the three lock focusing device by which the front locks automatically at 8, 20, or 100 feet focus. This makes focusing very simple yet greatly increases the scope of the camera. With the focus set at the 20 foot mark, the instrument may be used as a fixed focus camera.

The No. 2 Folding Brownie has a reversible finder for vertical or horizontal exposures, two tripod sockets. It is covered with a fine quality imitation leather, has full nickeled fittings, and is beautifully finished.

The back of the Folding Brownie is hinged, and opens by a single motion to allow insertion of the roll of film.

THE Kodak Developing Machines are constructed of brass and fully nickeled, and are durable and handsome.

They may be readily packed in the traveler's trunk or suit case, or the style A, E and H Machines may be carried as hand baggage in their handsome wooden cases. All Kodak or Brownie film cartridges may be developed in these machines. Any roll holder cartridges, except the No. 4 Horizontal (4-inch spool) and the No. 5, may also be developed in the Kodak Developing Machine. Full directions for operating accompany each machine.

Kodaks and Brownies with Portrait Attachments

KODAKS and Brownie Cameras are splendidly adapted to portraiture. With a 50 cent attachment on the small instruments one can make good sized head and shoulder pictures, while the attachments which we now furnish for the Cartridge and other Kodaks of larger size, enable one to make bust portraits of any size desired, limited only by the dimensions of the plate.

The Kodak Portrait Attachments are simply extra lenses which slip on in front of the regular lenses. The quality of work

done with them is the very best.

They in no way affect the operation of the fixed focus Kodaks except that they make them cut sharp at a distance of 31/2 feet, and thus throw more distant objects out of focus.

With those Kodaks which are not fixed focus a table is provided for setting the focus to obtain bust pictures of various sizes.
